Jacqui Lindsay: I love thi conversation — and the work you're sharing — that is providing a framework for all of us about how to move beyond the truth telling to using the run to change people's lives as well as the systems that caused harm in the first place. I'm not sure I want us to slow down the process. I want instead to see us accelerate the learning and fully develop our understanding about what follow up is needed to produce the real system change and repair the community wants. So big thanks for this conversation. I see it as an important beginning to a conversation we all need to continue to be a part of and to share with others. I'm totally inspired by what I'm learning from you. Yes, truth telling, learning, accountability, and reconciliation — that center the voices, knowledge, and priorities of victims. so that ALL of us and our institutions can change to honor the humanity of us all.
