What is the iZone?

 The Innovation Zone (iZone) is a community of innovative New York City schools committed to personalizing learning.

 By doing so, iZone students will be better prepared for success in K-12, college, and career.

 Across the iZone, schools are achieving personalization in a variety of ways based on the needs of their particular school community.

Innovation Zone Mission and Strategies Moving Forward

iZone

Build schools around the needs, strengths, and motivations of individual students

iZone360

New school models that organize all resources (budgets, staff, space, time, instruction, technology) around needs, strengths, and motivations of individual students

- Beginning in SY 11-12
- 26 schools

iLearnNYC

Flexibly meeting the needs of individual students through online and blended learning

- 41 schools in SY 10-11
- 125 schools in SY 11-12

InnovateNYC

Piloting, evaluating, and scaling promising innovations that leverage technology to accelerate student learning

 Approx. 40 Time and Staffing, School of One and Personalized Learning Systems schools in SY 10-11 and SY 11-12

Supports and Resources

iZone pledges ongoing supports and resources to better personalize learning.

School Level

- Personalized learning plans via adaptive learning software and other tools that provide real-time data on student progress
- Anywhere/anytime learning through online learning, all guided by a NYC teacher
- Hardware to support tech tools and infrastructure improvements to effectively use it
- Teacher training on tools and strategies that enable greater personalization
- Technical and programmatic support from iZone staff and expert, external partners

Network Level

- Building leadership and support capacity
- Structured collaboration among schools for shared problem solving
- New FTEs: Innovation coach/Implementation managers

Policy Reforms

- Successfully advocated for NYSTL revisions freeing textbook funds for instructional technology
- Successfully advocated for credit accumulation based on online coursework
- Submitted waiver with Big 5 to allow credit accumulation irrespective of seat time

iZone in Action

- An AP US History teacher teaches students in-person at their own school and virtually at another school that lacks a qualified AP US History teacher
- High school extending the school year to 200 days within the UFT contract by staggering teacher vacations
- Students stick with lessons, units, or assignments until they have demonstrated mastery
- Elementary school teachers use adaptive learning software to differentiate each day's lesson to each student's needs
- Using assessment data, teachers learn which units they are most effective at teaching, and then they teach those units several times a year to different groups of students

iZone Evaluation

Evaluation by internal and external teams helps the DOE understand the impact of current innovations as well as inform design and implementation decisions.

STUDENT OUTCOMES: ACHIEVEMENT AND ATTITUDES/ ENGAGEMENT

- Do iZone students show greater achievement gains than their peers than noniZone schools?
- Do iZone students demonstrate greater gains in the habits of mind (for example, student engagement, self-directed learning, cognitive strategies) than their peers?

TEACHERS ATTITUDES AND BEHAVIORS

 Do teachers show greater change in practice and attitude (e.g., about teacher roles, teacher efficacy, technology utilization) than their peers?

IMPLEMENTATION

- What is the scale and scope of innovation in schools (which components are implemented, how, who is involved, what students are served)?
- What PD, if any, was offered (e.g., frequency, operation, participation, efficacy)?
- What were the successes and challenges of program implementation?
- How do teachers respond to innovations?

Making a System-wide Impact
